Dear Judicial Candidate:

We appreciate steps taken by the Arkansas Supreme Court to safeguard the integrity of the judicial campaign process. Their revisions to the Judicial Code of Conduct, which became effective July 1, 2009, have helped to clarify how the Arkansas judicial campaign process should be conducted. We agree with Justice Robert L. Brown who said, "Arkansas has been fortunate in that it has not fallen victim to the toxic and vitriolic judicial campaigns of our sister-states or to the considerable expense those campaigns have engendered." R. Brown; "Toxic Judicial Elections: A Proposed Remedy," *The Arkansas Lawyer*, vol. 44 No. 4, Fall 2009, p. 12.

In the same article, Justice Brown discussed what should be included in a judicial voters' guide. "What typically goes into a voters' guide is information about the duties and term of the elective office; the education, professional background, and community involvement of the candidate; a personal statement from the candidate on why he or she is running and is the best person for the job; a photograph of the candidate; and the candidate's contact information. What is not included, though the voting public would dearly love to have it, are the candidates' positions on controversial issues." *Id.* at 40.

Not everyone agrees that a judicial voter's guide should be so limited in scope. The U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Republican Party of Minnesota v. White*, 536 U.S. 765 (2002) ruled that Minnesota's judicial canon prohibiting judges from discussing their views on political issues violated their first amendment rights. This has created debate in numerous sectors and seems to be still up for legal and social debate. This is why we have avoided asking judicial candidates their views of controversial issues such as *Roe v. Wade*, religious activities in public schools, or the constitutionality of mandates requiring citizens to purchase health insurance.
